

You might want to ask someone to help you read it.




A Caesarean is an operation and is always done in hospital.




You can have someone with you, a birth partner.



A midwife will also be with you to support.



Everyone, including your birth partner, will change into theatre clothing known as Scrubs.



You will be given some medicine so it does not hurt during the operation.




This is usually via a needle into your back - a spinal injection.

This will make your legs feel heavy and numb.



Or you may be put to sleep.

This is very rare as we want you to be awake when your baby is born.



A doctor will talk to you about having a spinal or a general anaesthetic (being put to sleep).




The team will check that the medicine (anaesthetic) is working before they start the Caesarean.




Your tummy will be cleaned with soap.

This will help to prevent any infection.



They will cover you with a surgical drape.

This is a sheet that will keep you covered and clean during your Caesarean.




They will put a tube into your bladder to drain your wee.

This stays in whileyour legs are numb and you cannot get to the toilet.




You may feel your tummy being moved but you should not feel pain.



A cut will be made low down in your tummy.

You will not feel this.



This is to make an opening for your baby to be born.



After your baby has been born the opening in your tummy will be closed with stitches.



When your baby is born the doctor will need to check inside your vagina. You will not feel this.

## tablet up your bum hole



They will give you pain relief medicine into your bottom as a suppository - this is a tablet up your hum hole


## see your baby



If you are awake, you will be able to see your baby if you want.

You will be supported to hold your baby if you want to.

recovery



Afterwards you will be taken to an area to recover before going to the postnatal ward.



Our staff will support you and your baby throughout your hospital stay.

## contraceptive implant contraception implant or rod

If you are having a contraceptive implant placed this will be done in hospital.
